Author Bjarnhild, who has been living in Shetland since 1966, is inspired by a number of authors, including Agatha Christie and James Patterson. *Terror in the Arctic* has been compared favourably to *Helga*, the autobiography of Helga Gerhardi, who was 15 years old when the war started.
